# HOLIDAYS & TRADITIONS

As the winter falls upon us, so do many holidays and traditions that are celebrated by our diverse student body throughout the months of December and January. We want to highlight the many traditions and holidays celebrated by our students, but first, what is a holiday and tradition?

A holiday is simply a day of festivity. Though commonly associated with national or internationally recognized festivities, a holiday is just any day which is typically accompanied by a day of rest in commemoration of an event. This can be understood through the British meaning of the word- a vacation.

A tradition however, is a pre-established practice. This can be cultural, religious, or even something uniquely celebrated just by you or within your family. Traditions are passed down from generation to generation and carry great significance for those celebrating them. Holidays are often accompanied by traditions that vary based on location, culture, religion, and identity.



## **Traditions at Gonzaga**

The Gonzaga University Tree Lighting Ceremony has been held annually in the Hemmingson Center since its beginning in 2015. The event is free of cost and takes place at the Hemmingson Rotunda. Last year, the Big Bing Theory, a student a cappella group sang carols to spread the holiday spirit. The lighting of the tree, regardless of holiday traditions celebrated represents a "gathering for community," and the ending of the semester for students, faculty, and staff.

## **DECEMBER HOLIDAYS & TRADITIONS**

#### **BODHI DAY**

#### December 8th, 2024

Bodhi Day is a Buddhist holiday that commemorates the day that Gautama Buddha attained enlightenment under the Bodhi Tree. The holiday is primarily observed in Eastern Asia which is home where Mahayana traditions of Buddhism are practiced. In Japan, this holiday is known as Rohatsu while in China, it is known as Laba. Bodhi Day is a time to reflect on Buddha's teachings and study the Dharma. Some Buddhists may decorate trees with lights, beads, and reflective ornaments.

## **OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE**

December 12th, 2024

The Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe or The Day of the Virgin of Guadalupe is a holiday associated with the Catholic Church and is celebrated primarily in Mexico and parts of Latin America. It's a Catholic Feast Day that commemorates the appearance of the Virgin Mary, Mexico's patron saint. Many families set up altars in their homes with images, decorations, candles, and flowers. A special mass is held at churches around the country followed by a feast with traditional foods.



#### **CHRISTMAS**

#### December 25th, 2024

Christmas is celebrated by Christians to celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ. The holiday is primarily observed on December 25th, but the date varies depending on the region and religion. In the United States, families decorate their homes and give gifts. In France, they host a feast called Le Réveillon. Japanese people have a tradition of ordering KFC for Christmas Dinner. There are a wide variety of traditions and cultural expressions associated with Christmas.

## **DECEMBER HOLIDAYS & TRADITIONS**

#### HANUKKAH

#### December 25th, 2024 - January 2nd, 2025

Hanukkah is an 8-day Jewish festival known as the Festival of Lights. The word Hanukkah translates to "dedication" referring to the rededication of the Second Temple in Jerusalem. The lighting of the Menorah is a tradition associated with Hanukkah. During each night, one candle on the Menorah is lit with blessings that vary. Playing dreidel is a traditional game during Hanukkah that was originally created to aid Jews to learn Hebrew. Hanukkah is celebrated by Jewish people all around the world.



### **KWANZAA**

December 26th, 2024 - January 1st, 2025

Kwanzaa is a week-long cultural holiday that celebrates African-American culture and is based on African harvest festival traditions. The seven principles, Nguzo Saba, are celebrated on each day of the holiday. Each night, a candle is lit to represent one of the seven principles. On December 31st, a feast called Karamu is held to celebrate community and features African and Caribbean dishes, music, and dancing. On the last day of the holiday, gifts (Zawadi) are given to children and guests.



#### INCWALA

#### December 28th, 2024

Incwala, Festival of the First Fruits, is celebrated by the Kingdom of Eswatini. This holiday marks the beginning of the first harvest season and the main ritual of kingship. Prior to Incwala Day, there is a festival that lasts four days. People perform rituals and ceremonies for the king on the first and second day. The third day is called Big Incwala where king tastes the first fruits of the harvest. The final day is marked by purification, song, and dance.

Advocacy centered around IDPD aims to inspire actions that foster accessibility and address inequality. Each year the UN selects a theme for the day, focusing on specific aspects of disability inclusion.



## **Queer Student Union**

Gonzaga University's QSU (Queer Student Union) is a club that supports LGBTQ+ students by raising awareness and fostering acceptance. Founded over 20 years ago, QSU was originally known as HERO (Helping Educate Regarding Orientation). In 2018, they changed their name to QSU. The club aims to build community and create a welcoming space for LGBTQ+ identifying students. QSU hosts a variety of events, such as a club camping trip and the annual QSU drag show. In the Spokane community, the club works with Spokane Pride, the Odyssey Youth Movement, and the Spectrum Center. Currently, QSU has 180 members and is working on increasing their collaboration efforts both on and off campus.

QSU's Signature event is the annual Drag Show, which was the first UACC event in the Hemmingson Ballroom. Nate Mongan, the Drag Show Event Chair, shared that Drag is an art form that impersonates a gender. It can be comedy, entertainment, and a form of activism. This event is important to the club because it provides students with a safe space to express themselves. This past October, QSU hosted their 10th annual Drag Show themed "Night of the Living Drag Killer Kweens" in line with Halloween. The event included a variety of snacks and mocktails, and encouraged students to come in their Halloween costumes. The program featured three drag queens, one drag king, and four student performers, with a student participation section allowing audience members to lip sync and walk on the runway. Nate Mongan hopes to see this event grow with more audience participation and Spokane community involvement in the next year.

## **South Asian Student Union**



The South Asian Student Union (SASU) was founded in November 2022. During their freshmen year, Deeya Chandran and Anisa Grewal wanted create a space where they could celebrate Diwali away from home. They were asked if they wanted to create student organization and decided to start SASU as copresidents. Now, SASU has grown significantly, with efforts to engage the Desi community in Spokane and South Asian students at Gonzaga University.

Last year, SASU held their first signature event "Diwali - The Festival of Lights" which featured a variety of performances and a buffet of South Asian cuisine. For this year's event, they renamed their event "Mela" which is Sanskrit for Festival or Gathering. The theme was "Journey of Dreams" which showcased SASU's growth as individual students and as a community. The performances were representative of what brought the SASU members here and where they aim to go next. They had their first club-wide performance with 50 performers and volunteers for the event, hosted multiple vendors selling jewelry and henna, and sold 240 tickets to Gonzaga students and Spokane community members. Deeya and Anisa are looking forward to future "Mela" events and how the underclassmen will put their own spin on it.

Outside of their signature event, SASU hosts weekly club meetings and a Holi event in the spring. Some of their club activities include playing carrom and learning Garba. This Spring, SASU will be hosting their Holi Event which is a significant Hindu Festival where people gather together and throw colored powder. Outside of their club meetings, they collaborate with the Natanam Dance School in Spokane which specializes in Bollywood and Bharatanatyam dance. This year, SASU hopes to grow their club and continue to provide a community for South Asians at Gonzaga.
