Hispanic Heritage Month

Every year, the United States celebrates Hispanic Heritage Month from September 15th to October 15th in honor of the contributions of our Hispanic & Latinx community. First celebrated in 1968 under President Johnson, this weeklong celebration of heritage grew into a month-long observance under President Reagan in 1988. This celebration begins in alignment with the independence of multiple Latin American countries. On September 15th, we celebrate the independence of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua. These countries jointly declared independence from Spain in what was formerly the Central American Federation on September 15th, 1821. This month also encapsulates the Mexican Independence Day on September 16th, Chile's Independence on September 18th, and Belize's Independence from the United Kingdom on September 21st. Parades like these resemble celebrations held in the respective countries as they celebrate their independence.

LANGUAGE BRINGS US TOGETHER

There are 21 countries that consider Spanish their official language: Spain, Mexico, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Nicaragua, Panama, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Argentina, Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, Ecuador, Paraguay, Peru, Uruguay, Venezuela, and Equatorial Guinea.

Spanish is the second most spoken language in the world and in America and the second most studied language in the country, with over 50 million speakers and 5 million learners! The Royal Spanish Academy created the first Spanish dictionary in 1726 to standardize the language. A Spanish-speaking country is anywhere that Spanish is spoken by a large portion of the population. Spanish does not have to be the official language of a country to be considered Spanish-speaking. Countries where Spanish is an unofficial language include the United States, Western Sahara, the Philippines, Gibraltar, Belize, and Andorra.

Creole languages are a blend of the native tongue with an imperial influence language over a short period of time. Spanish has been a large influence on Creole languages, especially in Latin America. Judeo-Spanish, also called "Ladino", is a Jewish interpretation of Spanish spoken by a small population, mainly in Israel.

DIVERSITY

There is no single "look" for Hispanic people because of the diversity of their backgrounds and ethnicities, Hispanic/Latinx people can have a variety of skin tones, facial features, and physical appearances:

Latines come from 33 different countries in Latin America, each with their own traditions, customs, languages, and ethnicities. Hispanic people can be of any race and may have origins in Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Central and South America, the Dominican Republic, or other Latin American or Spanish origins.

POPULATION

The Census Bureau estimates there were 65.2 million Hispanics in the U.S. as of July 1, 2023, a new high, making up more than 19% of the nation's population.

World Mental Health Month

While October marks the transition from summer to fall, it is an important month as it recognizes World Mental Health Month. The World Federation for Mental Health (WFMH) established World Mental Health Day on October 10, 1992. The objective of this day is to raise awareness of mental health issues around the world, support mental health initiatives, and promote mental well-being globally. As mental health challenges affect millions of people globally, it is essential that this month promotes understanding, support, and the prioritization of mental health in policies and communities.

Breast Cancer Awareness Month



Breast Cancer Awareness Month is observed every October, as a time to raise awareness about the impact of breast cancer. Acknowledging September

Childhood Cancer Awareness Month: Observed in September each year, it is dedicated to raising awareness about pediatric cancer, the leading cause of death by disease in children. The gold ribbon is the international symbol for childhood cancer awareness.





Suicide Prevention Month: Observed every September to raise awareness about suicide, its causes, and prevention strategies. Suicide Prevention Week, typically the second week of September, focuses on education, reducing stigma, and encouraging open conversations about mental health. To bring light to the 1,100 college students who commit suicide each year, the Gonzaga University Student Body Association created 1,100 paper flowers and set them on Herak lawn as a tribute. Both his mother and father come from the town of Doctor Arroyo, in Nuevo Leon, Mexico, and while Adrian was born and raised in Walla Walla,

WA, his Mexican American roots run deep. Both sets of grand parents were migrant farm workers at some point in their lives, chasing crops across the country, and Adrian remembers being told stories by his maternal grandmother, who never left Texas, of picking cotton in the Texas heat. When Adrian's father finally settled down in Walla Walla, it was because Adrian's mother's refusal to keep living the migrant lifestyle for her family. Her stubbornness became a success story, as Adrian's father eventually had a career at the paper mill Boise Cascade and his mother worked for the U.S. Corps of Engineers.

When Adrian first came to Gonzaga in 1989, after graduating from La Salle High School in Walla Walla, Gonzaga was still a small school with barely 1200 students. But Spokane was the big city. Which taught him a few lessons.

- 1. It's important to have someone to look up to. Everyone needs a mentor. Adrian emphasizes leadership and mentoring of students as an important goal for Gonzaga faculty and staff members, but also for students. To make a friend, be a friend.
- **2.** Never forget your roots. We are all from somewhere else, whether Europe, Asia, or the Americas. Join an affinity group at Gonzaga.
- 3. Make connections. Connections can be anyone, from a similar or dissimilar background. Participate with those around you as they celebrate their own cultural heritage month.
- **4.** Finally, know your history. Our family and ethnic connections are both our past and our future. Never forget who you are or where you came from.

The academy offers a multidisciplinary program that addresses topics such as **oppression**, **antiracism**, **equity**, **inclusion**, **privilege**, **implicit bias**, **and gender identities**.

Participants must attend a 1-hour orientation, complete 10 workshops (each 2.5 hours), and work on a cohort project. Graduates will receive an "Inclusive Excellence Certificate" and complete an Intercultural Development Inventory assessment.
