## **Faculty Spotlight**

**A Fond Farewell** 



#### Fr. Patrick Hartin

Originally from South Africa, Fr. Hartin found his way to Spokane after learning of a position teaching New Testament at Gonzaga University while teaching briefly at the Claremont Colleges. In his 21

years at Gonzaga, he has noticed changes in the technology, campus buildings, along with the population, diversity, and spirit of the students. His favorite part about teaching at Gonzaga is the interaction with the students, which Fr. Hartin mentions is in stark contrast to the British model of teaching that he used in South Africa. Fr. Hartin has taught classes for both the Religious Studies and the Classics Departments, and each class he teaches holds its own value, so he cannot pick a favorite. Religious Studies classes hold formative value and meet students wherever they are in their spiritual journeys. Fr. Hartin believes students should study religion because it is deeply ingrained within the heritage of Western Civilization, and it helps us to know who we are and where we come from. It enables students to engage with others who may hold different perspectives. Studying religion can help students make religion their own, and look at religion in an adult way. He advises students to be passionate and question things, rather than blindly accepting something. In retirement Fr. Hartin plans to add to the eighteen books he has already written, and while he will miss the classroom, he will enjoy visiting his brothers and sisters in South Africa about once a year.



#### **Dr. John Downey**

Dr. Downey was recruited to teach at Gonzaga 34 years ago because of his distinctive approach to the study of Theology. His preferred approach, known as fundamental theology, delves

into how we think about religion, along with how religion relates to culture and philosophy. He has taught a variety of courses while at Gonzaga, including Religion and the Human Experience, Political Theology, St. Francis of Assisi, and the Bubonic Plague. Although he cannot pick a favorite, Dr. Downey believes that each course provides spectacular ways of understanding how religion is at work in our lives today. He advocates for students to study religion in order to be trained to think critically about religion, since it can be both liberating and restricting. Dr. Downey also believes that religion and the questions it attempts to answer are fundamental parts of being human. He encourages students to ask questions and be open to dialogue with experts in order to understand new perspectives, therefore discovering who they are and what they stand for. Dr. Downey is going to treat his retirement like an extended Sabbatical, and plans to do research and write a book on St. Francis of Assisi "for real people."

## **Student Spotlight**



## Sean Richards Class of 2016

Sean is a political science and international relations double major, with a minor in Religious Studies. He is most interested in how religion and politics interact with one another, each informing the

other and says that "the academy provides a very unique and highly beneficial setting for studying religion that cannot be easily replicated elsewhere."

Sean was one of eighteen students to participate in this year's week long Winter School Program (WSP) organized by the International Institute of Islamic Thought (IIIT). At the program, he listened to lectures given by scholars from across the U.S. and Canada, with topics including "hadith studies, modern Islamic finance, Islam in America, Islam and modernity, the magasid approach to al-shariah, and the question of how 'Islamic' ISIS really is." Sean says he "finished the program with a much clearer appreciation for just how large and diverse the field of Islamic thought is today... it was interesting to see how the fields of Christian thought and Islamic thought were very similar in some respects but quite distinct in others... it was valuable seeing how differences in areas such as theology, practice, and religious history have developed into both these similarities and differences." For him, "attending the program was an all-around fantastic experience."

Sean urges fellow students to be critical of general terms and really unpack what they mean. After graduation, Sean plans to spend a year volunteering for the Jesuit Volunteer Corp and later attended a graduate program for Middle Eastern Studies.
