strives to build upon and support initiatives that promote the University's mission to develop a comprehensive international ethos throughout Gonzaga.

The IEC awards (up to \$3500) Global Engagement faculty development funding to develop global engagement components for a course(s), pursue research/scholarly and creative endeavors, or create opportunities for collaboration with international faculty and students.
