


These reports are reviewed by staff in the Resolution Center to determine if there is sufficient information that a violation of the Student Code of Conduct may have occurred.


Student Conduct and Alternative Resolution Processes



COVID-19 Compliance Concerns

The Resolution Center developed a reporting platform accessible to the campus community which routed concerns to the office best suited to respond. In addition to reports received from University Departments, 125 reports were routed to the Resolution Center. Reported concerns included other alleged violations of the Student Code of Conduct along with the following COVID-19 related concerns:

March 30, 2021 Incident Context

The Resolution Center received over 70 reports regarding a mass gathering around Nora and Cincinnati after the Gonzaga Men's Basketball Team's victory in the Elite Eight. This gathering was characterized as having approximately 400 people gathered in the street blocking traffic. Images and videos posted to social media showed un-masked individuals gathering publicly consuming alcohol and a couch on fire. The reporting parties' and University's greatest concerns are the apparent disregard for following COVID-19 protocols, the danger this posed to the Gonzaga and Spokane community, and the great disruption this caused in the Logan neighborhood.

Conduct Processes were initiated for students reported to have been present at the gathering. 51 students accepted responsibility for their involvement on the front end without meeting with a conduct officer. The Resolution Center scheduled meetings with the other 130 students that were included in reports. Most reports contained little to no evidence of individuals involvement. Through those processes, 46 students were found responsible for a violation of the Student Code of Conduct related to attending the gathering, while 84 students were found not responsible.

The 97 responsible students were assigned outcomes, included Warnings, COVID-19 Policy & Expectation Reviews, Civic Service, Donations, and Reflection Assignments.

Civic Service

Students were provided the option to engage in service for a non-profit organization, preferably local to Spokane. At this time, no students have submitted completed service hours so there is no information regarding number of hours served in the community as a response to this incident, but 21 students have outstanding deadlines.

Donations

Students pledged donations to 4 different community organizations. The following provides information about donations made to date to the selected organizations, with 27 students with deadlines outstanding:

- Catholic Charities Eastern Washington \$2,000.00 Donated
- Community Health Association of Spokane (CHAS) Create Health Equity \$4,375 Donated
- Opportunity Northeast \$1,125 Donated
- St. Aloysius Gonzaga Catholic School Leading with Hope \$2,500

Reflection Assignments

Students were provided two options for a prompt. Once selected, students read articles and watched a video related to the prompt and completed their reflection of the topic. The two topics were:

- COVID-19 Privilege and Low-Income Health Risks
- Understanding Neighbors in the Context of Ignatian Principles
